Dear All,

My newspaper tells me that the current Sunday night period drama Downton Abbey is attracting eleven million viewers - and I am one of them! At the time this drama is set, choices are opening up for people, particularly for women in relation to their possible occupations and right to vote. This has prompted me to think about the choices we have today, whether we take them for granted, whether we value them and how we use them.

It is not uncommon now to hear the complaint that we have too much choice, we don't know where to start and that even if we do our choice won't make a difference. Some of the issues can seem so complex that we are tempted to give up and leave it all to others.

What can we do, and can it make a difference to our lives and that of others? We might start by thinking about the small choices we can make on our own patch and in our own day-to-day lives, and these will be different for all of us. We can choose whether or not to take a bit of extra time to cooperate with the new recycling scheme and so reduce the amount of landfill waste. We can choose to do at least some of our shopping at our two local shops at the heart of our village which serve us so well. We can continue the 'ready smile' widely commented on during the Olympics period this summer which people noticed did seem to lift our spirit.

It is good to see the current Parish Council interest in producing a Neighbourhood Plan. We will be consulted. We will be asked to make choices, to give our views.

Two other 'choices' are flagged up in this month's magazine. Hilary Harber, writing for the Fairtrade Village Group, provides some information to help us when we shop. District Cllr Bob David is giving us the opportunity to meet and question the candidates in the imminent Surrey Police Commissioner election. I am at the moment at a complete loss about this last one! It is a new 'choice'. It sounds as though it is important and that we should know more about it and vote. Here is our chance.

### The Pond

I agree wholeheartedly with the comments made by Dawn Forrester-Groom in the October issue of the magazine.

I feel our pond has not been the special feature of the village it was in years gone by. Looking back at old pictures and postcards of the pond it is sad to see the state of what was once an attractive feature, now just a mass of water surrounded by overgrown grasses and sedge. In fact it is difficult to see that there is a pond at all.

A few years ago the pond had beautiful koi and delicate ornamental plants. It had a maintenance programme by the Parish Council which ensured the pond re-

mained in a healthy condition. This maintenance, carried out twice a year, included the removal of rubbish and debris, removal of dying-back foliage, cutting back plants which had become too large for the position, and ensuring the pond was kept in a manageable condition. Many of these plants, although not indigenous (native) to this country, were like many plants used in our floral displays, developed for their beauty and also to encourage wildlife to the plants. By the very nature of those plants, their growth was less invasive than the grasses and sedge which at present are taking over our village pond.

I often drive past Blindley Heath pond and wish our pond could be half as well looked after as that one. Perhaps we could find out how they do it, for it would be a wonderful thing to have our pond restored as an attractive feature.

#### **Broadband Appeal**

I write to appeal for you to **Register Your Interest** on the BT Website for **fibre optic broadband (BT Infinity)**.

BT have now put the date of installation back twice, and the current estimated installation date is 31st December 2012. Back in April, the estimated installation

date was June 30th 2012, then 4 days before the deadline it was rolled back to 30th September 2012, and then 4 days before that deadline it was rolled back again to 31st December!

I fear if there is not more of a push from villagers to register their interest in the scheme then the date will once again be rolled back. I cannot emphasise enough how much of a positive impact this technology would have on the village, both on our day-to-day digital household needs as well as the needs of local businesses and the village school.

On past experience it is a lengthy business but has enabled Tatsfield to evolve in the way that villagers wish and informs the action plans of the Parish Council on your behalf.

Hopefully this new community facility will be in constant use. Everyone worked so hard on this project and we are delighted with the outcome but it will be dependent on everyone, young and old, keeping an eye on it and reporting any misuse.

**New Recycling and Waste Collections:** Tandridge's new system of alternate weekly collections of recycling and waste and weekly collections of food waste started at the beginning of last month and overall has gone very well, with

an increase of 20% in recycling in the first week and an even larger increase in the second week. There have been teething problems of course, including much of Tatsfield having its recycling collection delayed by a day in the third week. Apart from that problem in the third week, I have had very few complaints. With the new system we have to remember which week refuse is collected and which week it is the turn of waste. I have been told by many that it does help to keep handy the calendar supplied to every household by Tandridge which shows clearly the right dates for us. Don't hesitate if you are uncertain about anything or have any problems phone Tandridge 01883 722000 email on or customerservices@tandridge.gov.uk.

**Election of Surrey's First Police and Crime Commissioner:** The election will be taking place on Thursday 15 November, when you will be able to cast your vote at the Village Hall between 7am and 10pm. The new Commissioner will replace the existing Surrey Police Authority and will be responsible for policing and crime prevention in Surrey. You only have to read those words to realise that it is an important position and that the actions of the person who is elected will affect the lives of all of us who live here. So we should try to find out something about the

candidates for the job and what their plans are before we decide whom to vote for. The trouble is that there is not much information readily available, although it is true that there is a lot we can discover via the internet. I have also arranged a public meeting in Tatsfield when all six of the candidates will be attending - 8pm on Wednesday 7 November at the WI Hall. You will find the details on page 23. I hope you will take the trouble to come to the meeting, listen to what the candidates have to say and question them if you wish - and then vote on 15 November for the candidate of your choice.

**Meet your MP:** There is another public meeting I have arranged this month – with our MP. Sam Gyimah. This again will be at the WI Hall and will take place on Friday 30 November starting at 8 pm (the details are on page 23). You will be able to hear Sam speak about current national and local issues and there will be plenty of time to ask questions and to chat informally with him. I hope again that many will take advantage of this opportunity.

## SURREY COUNTY COUNCIL

Winter Maintenance: I am pleased to report that SCC is ready for the winter - we have 16,000 tons of salt ready in **SURREY** stock across Surrey. We have our contractors ready with 16 new vehicles, and we have 51 farmers across Surrey ready to act (the highest ratio of farmers supporting SCC are in this

area of Surrey). Last year we added over 100 miles of Priority roads across Surrey and that investment is continuing again this year. All grit bins have been filled. A special thanks to Parish Councillor Doug Massey, who has done so much good work behind the scenes in helping with all Highway matters. Surrey County Council's cabinet was delighted with the offer of support from the Tatsfield community to undertake a trial on behalf of the County Council to close roads etc when snow arrives. This is real localism in action and, depending upon the results of this trial, as Leader of SCC I hope to extend this outwards in Surrey. Tatsfield is leading the way again.

Allotments: I am pleased to report that I succeeded in obtaining a grant of £1,700 to support the allotments in ensuring that electricity can now be installed there. Does that mean a cup of tea when I visit?

Tatsfield in Bloom: My wife, Anne, and I were delighted to join so many local residents for your Celebration Evening on 12 October. Once again the outstanding quality of the dedicated and hard work has paid off.

## SUPPORTING A SPORTING LEGACY by Katherine Vale

This November, as many of us reflect on how proud we are to be living as members of a village which has recently achieved a Silver Gilt award in the Britain in Bloom competition, some among us are enviably also reflecting upon their time spent being a part of another great achievement- the London 2012 Olympic and Paralympic games.

Between Friday 31<sup>st</sup> August and Saturday 8<sup>th</sup> September, Abi Collins of Pond Cottages found herself a key member of a voluntary team ensuring the smooth running of the largest Paralympic games ever held, an experience which she describes as being 'the best thing I have ever done!'. Each day Abi made the journey into the games via a drive into Ebbsfleet followed by catching the Javelin Highspeed train into the centre of London.

As an Event Services Team Leader, Abi's roles included leading a team of 10 volunteers per day both in and around the stadium, completing tasks such as checking tickets, helping spectators find where they needed to go, and even rescuing lost children among many others!



Despite the late returns into Tatsfield, frequently reaching 11:30-12:00 at night, all of her hard work was worth it. Abi says she felt wholly appreciated and received several badges, a letter of recognition from David Cameron and a baton from Seb Coe - undoubtedly things to treasure in the years to come.

Interestingly, during my questioning I uncovered that Abi had a unique motivation to be a part of the Olympic experience. In 1964 Abi was being trained as a hurdler by a private coach to compete in the 1968 Olympics held in Mexico. Despite her talents, other interests led to her leaving these Olympic dreams behind. But when the opportunity to be a part of another Olympic games appeared, it was her chance to finally make it into the stadium. The highlight of Abi's time was her work within the stadium itself. The exciting atmosphere created by the 84,000 spectators

clapping, cheering and at times crying was breath-taking. On one such day she was lucky enough to witness Jonnie Peacock win Gold in the 100 metres event as well as David Weir win the wheelchair 1500 metres!

When asked what the Paralympic and Olympic 2012 games have done for Britain, Abi responded that they have simply 'brought everyone together',



as well as restoring faith in the future of Great Britain. Whilst many people originally displayed doubt as to the likelihood of the success and smooth running of such a huge event, they have been proved wrong.

Now that the games are over, thoughts turn to how they will be presented in Rio in 2016 – many of us are looking forward to seeing how they compare with the wonderful experience of London 2012!


The Old Ship has been in new hands since June and many changes have been made to its decor and to the way it is run. Have you been in to have a drink or to try the food? If you haven't, why not do so

## THE POND ON WESTMORE GREEN - A BRIEF HISTORY

Tatsfield's pond was originally a dew pond, most probably constructed, as was customary, by a professional maker of such ponds. Dew ponds are circular, lined with puddled clay, often by a road, which provided runoff water. The traditional dew pond design ensured an adequate water supply from rainfall by maximising the pond's catchment area in relation to its evaporation area. A normal dew pond is at least 18m across its water surface with a further collection margin.

Ponds were the usual source of water for fire fighting, for swelling the wood of cartwheels, for animals, etc. Once constructed they needed maintenance on a regular basis, but it was imperative not to disturb the puddled clay bed.

Parish Council records show a long list of various efforts over about 100 years to maintain the pond. There were controversies over whether it was overflowing or leaking, whether there should be railings and whether it was such a 'disgrace' that it should be filled in! Unfortunately the pond base was disturbed on several occasions, irreparably so in 1971 when a group of residents dug out the original clay pond bed, concreted the base, and added a wall. The pond then lost water due to severe cracking of the concrete and seepage through the wall.

More recent events are:

**1977.** The Village Pond Association was formed at the instigation of Doris Geary, longstanding resident of Pond Cottages, with the great support of her brother, Frank Watson. The pond was leaking again, the concrete had cracked.

**1978.** The concrete was dug out, the pond base reshaped to the original saucer shape of a dew pond, lined with Bentonite clay after consultation with Tandridge District Council and advice from Steetley Minerals Limited.

**1980.** Doris Geary obtained commoner's rights to have ducks on the pond.

**1984.** The pond was leaking again. A representative of Steetley Minerals Limited put it down to a number of things: excessive salt from the road being washed in over the five year period, cracking, fissuring or settling of the subsoil, tree roots, plants being pulled out, etc.

**1985.** The pond was emptied completely, all Bentonite removed and with the help of many villagers gault clay donated by Redlands Sand Pits was puddled into the pond.

**1986.** By April this work had been carried out, the water level was high and the ducks and their duck house were on the pond again.

**1987.** By spring the water of the pond had disappeared rapidly again. In April I took over from Doris Geary as secretary of the Tatsfield Village Pond Association. By August, with the advice of Surrey County Council's chief ecologist and the British Trust for Conservation Volunteers, it was decided to enlist professional help and employ contractors experienced in pond restoration, recommended by Surrey. Funds were raised, with residents, village organisations, TDC, Safeways, Charringtons and Surrey Voluntary Service Council giving generously.

**1988.** In March the contractor left the site. Under the supervision of Surrey ecologist, John Edwards, the pond bed was reshaped as an 18m diameter dew pond, received a custom-made butyl liner with a projected life span of 50 years, protective layers of clay and silty soil, and an overflow on the northern side. The pipe draining surface water from the road into the pond was blocked off to stop pollution. Thames Water filled the pond. The Surrey ecologist advised on plants for the pond and members of the Pond Association planted accordingly. The duck house and ducks went back on the pond.

**1989.** Tandridge District Council diverted the drainage of the Approach Road, which we had blocked already, away from the pond, under Westmore Green and into Westmore Road.

Villagers were asked not to put any plants into the pond without consulting the Pond Association. Alas, various plants "turned up" in the pond, worst of all yellow irises, which spread rampantly. Even fish "turned up" despite their being detrimental to newt larvae. The aim was to have as much as possible a natural haven for water wildlife and, in spite of the ducks, newts and frogs thrived.

To keep the pond reasonably full of water, it needed topping up occasionally. The water table had changed drastically since the pond was first constructed, long before a number of houses and the Wedgwoods development had been built. Traditionally, trees were not planted near dew ponds, but in the 1920s those on Westmore Green were planted, taking up water. The Thames Water Laboratory advised that topping up with mains water, up to half the volume of the pond, would be acceptable, but more than 50 % could be harmful to invertebrates. Topping up occasionally would be preferable to land and road drainage leaving deposits from agrochemicals, petrol, salt, etc.

The Pond Association was disbanded in 1990 because no new secretary could be found and I could not continue. Responsibility was handed over to the Parish Council, who employed a contractor to "clean out" the pond periodically at great expense. They usually left the pond full of plant debris when they departed and never managed to halt the invasive plants. The pond was no longer being topped up but it held water and was not leaking. Water was lost through natural evaporation and therefore grass gradually grew into the pond from the edge due to the low water level and unfortunately reeds and irises started taking over.

It was decided to restore the pond yet again and since 2010 it has its present look, somewhat smaller than the previous version. To have a real wildlife pond in the village centre with no natural water supply other than rain is probably not possible. At the moment it looks again as though grasses are taking over too much of the pond surface. From an ecological point of view this is fine but it hardly makes for the centre of attraction of the village. It can probably never be a tranquil haven for water wildlife given all the traffic around it.

Over the years it has received the odd discarded bicycle, many a football and, to the distress of neighbours, even their vandalised flower pots. Maybe a compromise would be the right thing to do, with a greater area of water visible, occasional top ups if needed and clearing out of excessive plants in autumn when frogs and newts have left the pond.

MARJORIE HORWOOD 5 September 1930 – 14 September 2012

Marjorie, Sister, Miss Port, Mrs J, Mum, Auntie, Mrs Horwood, Nan and latterly 'The Great Nanma'.

We all think we know this lady but I would like to share a few thoughts and highlight some more unusual aspects of her life as we all remember a remarkable person of contrasts and surprises.

Her love of travelling with friends and family started in the early 1950s when, as a young bride of 20, she undertook a huge adventure journeying to a Ghanian gold mine, where she learned to dislike tinned fruit. Already able to speak French and German Mum



learned to speak Farsi during her next big adventure in Persia whilst I learned to speak.

Later she travelled to Canada, Europe, India and China, often with her life-long friend Betty. Despite her experiences she always worried about the little details - especially being on time or finding a hotel

Her first love remained books and libraries and it was to these she returned after being left to bring up two small boys by herself, studying part time to become a chartered Librarian. A remarkable achievement in an era when being a single parent was not easy let alone managing a professional career.

Working in Bromley Marjorie met Bill, a charming gentleman of the old school whom she married in 1970 and took on the care and responsibility of two additional teenage boys (William and John).

She moved on to become a neighbourhood librarian for Lambeth in charge of 3 libraries and even though she could quell unruly youths was really rather shy and retiring. At times she was so conscientious that if she could not remember having locked a library would return to check even if it was 11 pm.

I was often sent back to college with enough rich fruit cake to feed the 5000 and I remember the time she had taken me and a friend (now my brother-in-law) back to university and over coffee scanning his shelves only to observe that he did have the latest version of an obscure chemistry text book,

Never one to rest she was always trying different recipes, even taking a Cordon Bleu course in France, but she never really relished Indian or Chinese food.

Having taken early retirement she became more active in the church, becoming a lay-reader and church secretary at St Mary's in Tatsfield. Her sense of fair play allied to her social conscience, diplomacy, sensitivity and organisational skills enabled her to run the local CAB for the benefit of many.

Moving to Edenbridge was her choice and emphasised her independent spirit. Here she found a new church and the time to help in the local school listening to children practice their reading – something very dear to her. Wherever she went she left friends who are pleased to have known her.

Her interest in crosswords, word games etc which along with her wide general knowledge and a keen interest in music, literature, history and theatre made her a fearsome quiz competitor and a person you always wanted on your side. I have heard she was encouraged to be the question mistress for the Roman Court and WI quiz nights rather than always winning.

As if this wasn't enough in the same year as she gained her first grandson she gained an Open University arts degree. She was a member of MENSA and would rant at the television or radio at the incorrect use of English – 'different to' was a particular hate. However, for all her intellectual achievements, swimming and riding a bicycle were skills that eluded her.

When her mind was busy so were her hands, and her skills at sewing and knitting were much in demand by friends and family and I am sure many of you have seen the results of her handiwork.

Family were hugely important to her and she passed many happy hours keeping in touch with all branches of her extended family. She particularly enjoyed taking her grand-children on trips to the city, theatre, museums, farms and dungeons.

Embracing new technology, she become a dab hand at on-line shopping, surfing the net, skyping her grandsons and dashing off an email, but she still wrote letters and lists in beautiful, neat long hand using her gold fountain pen. Marjorie was always organised – despite the initial appearance of her flat – keeping detailed double-entry accounting records and filing her recipes and knitting patterns.

Mum was always willing to lend a helping hand to anyone but rarely made any demands for herself despite all that life threw at her.

If you believe that a person lives on as long as there are people to remember them, then Marjorie, Sister, Miss Port, Mrs J, Mum, Auntie, Mrs Horwood, Nan, 'The Great Nanma' will live on in our fond memories of her.

He has even been featured on page 3 twice - page 3 of the Angling Times that is!

Steve also enjoyed shooting clay pigeons with his friends. He shot with a lefthanded gun even though he was right handed because his right eye was damaged at work some years ago. This is a good demonstration of his determination; he would never let things stop him achieving.

He loved to share his evenings with friends and family in the local pubs and bars near his homes. The Crown in Lee was a regular haunt as was the Tatsfield Club and The Bakery. He would like nothing more than to discuss the day's events and the very latest jokes. He was partial to a pub quiz and he had a good knowledge of history, the world wars being a big favourite of his. However, you would sometimes find him walking around the pub, helping out some of the more struggling teams and even giving away the answers!

He had a natural friendly way with people and a wicked sense of humour. He made others feel very comfortable and special. He would always have time to help others - to fix a broken phone, to mend a leaky tap, to pick you up from the airport, to chat to at the bar or even to provide a shoulder to cry on.

Clothes, cigarettes and loose change can all encourage a break-in. ■Remove the stereo or stereo fascia if possible. ■Remove satellite navigation devices if possible, including the support cradle. ■ Wipe away any suction pad marks left on the dashboard or windscreen. ■Leave your glove box open to show it is empty. ■Close windows and sunroofs and lock the doors and boot. ■Keep your car parked in a garage if possible and lock both vehicle and garage. ■When away from home, or if you don't have a garage, always try to park in a well-lit, open location. ■Look after your car keys and keep them out of sight, even at home.

## ALLOTMENTS NEWS

As autumn approaches most plotters have cleared their plots ready for the winter – good preparation now will ensure good crops next year. We have a good and plentiful supply of horse manure, and sometimes chicken manure. Yields have been variable – we have re-

ports of totally ruined potato crops due to flooding, and bumper crops due to good rainfall – you never know what you are going to get at Tatsfield!

The compost site has now closed for the winter, although work will continue, erecting more bins, tidying the site, encouraging the screen hedge. We will notify you in good time when we open again next year. Plans are being made to install a French drain to take the surface water away from the area near the White House. This involves hiring a digger to make a trench which will then be filled with flints recycled from the site. We hope this will solve some of the drainage problems some have encountered.

Tatsfield in Bloom and the Horticultural Society have been given a container to store their materials and equipment; the intention is to locate it at the far end of the allotment site as the Borough Road site is to be vacated soon. The current path will be extended by a few metres to allow this to be as near the edge of the site as possible – every bit of space is valuable for growing purposes.

We have been verbally given the green light for a grant from Surrey County Council to install electricity onto the site. This will make a huge difference, enabling electrical machinery to be used, lighting in the winter months and dark evenings, ambient security lighting – and most important of all – tea making facilities!

Finally, on Sunday 7 October we held our annual BBQ. Not so well attended as last year when enthusiasm was running high - but a few die-hards attended and a good time was had by all. We managed to get fabulous weather again – despite cold and rain in the days before, and after – the gods are certainly shining down on Tatsfield allotments!

Further social functions are planned for the spring. Please keep looking and checking – we rely on support from all plot holders to make these occasions viable and enjoyable for all.

#### DO YOU REMEMBER VI JUPP?

New to Tatsfield's archives this month is a fascinating short history of Roland Cottage in Borough Road. It has come from a cousin of Vi Jupp, who lived all her life there until her death in 1988 when

the site was being re-developed and the new Roland Cottage was being built. The cousin came across Tatsfield's websites, saw Roland Cottage mentioned and offered a series of photographs of the inside of the original house from the 1980s as well as images of the garden and of Vi Jupp herself. What has now arrived is a presentation pack recording the history of the Jupps of Roland Cottage for which we are most grateful.

October also brought good news from Cornwall – the result of an enquiry in last month's magazine. Phillippa Roberts was trying to trace her father's side of her family. She knew they lived somewhere in Tatsfield between 1932 and 1938. She was looking for her grandfather, Philip Leonard Roberts, whose step-brother was Edward Stanley Page. His son, Victor, had been in the Navy but died young.

As so often happens with such enquiries, we can provide only half an answer at first. There is no Victor Page in our records, but there is Victor Roberts of Westmore Cottages who died at Christmas 1946 at the age of 19.

When I asked Phillippa whether Victor Page could be the Victor Roberts in her family tree, she sent a 1936 photo of her four year old father in Tatsfield - but with no hint of precise location. Her luck was in. The photo showed a house in Lusted Hall Lane (formerly Westmore Cottages) – almost certainly the one where Victor lived. This is the latest example of the use of the internet helping people build their family trees and helping local history groups trace the history of their area by accessing ever-growing sources of information.

The Tatsfield History Project began when I started weeding and scanning the Parish Council records a decade or two ago. We now have dozens of box files of records and more than 2,500 items have been scanned and stored in our digital archive. We drew on these records for 'Tatsfield the First Two Thousand Years' and for the school history in 2010.

There are only four of us in the Project and we need others to join us to carry on the work as we ourselves move closer to becoming history. All you need is real curiosity about people and events in Tatsfield's past and a healthy scepticism about assumed 'facts'. All are welcome; a quick message with a hint of your interests is all that's needed. What about coming on board?

#### WHAT'S IN A LABEL?

Have you noticed that many well-known brands are using prominent logos and are trying to reassure you that their product is ethical? As a keen supporter of Fairtrade products I have noticed that many leading

brands carry the Rainforest Alliance green frog logo on their packaging. I have also found that many people think they are buying Fairtrade coffee, tea or chocolate when they choose PG Tips, Tetleys, Kenco or Galaxy because of the Rainforest label. I thought I would investigate what the two labels mean.



The Rainforest Alliance is an independent organisation whose mark guarantees that at least 30% of the contents of the pack are ethically produced. That means that up to 70% of the tea, coffee or chocolate could be picked by workers paid a very low wage or working in poor conditions. Products that bear the Rainforest Alliance Certified logo meet strict standards in respect of a number of factors such as:

- preserving the local ecosystem, water and soil conservation including local wildlife,
- fair wages and medical care for workers,
- medical and educational provisions for families.

#### So what is the difference between Fairtrade and the Rainforest Alliance?

Fairtrade products are independently assessed and monitored to ensure high standards that guarantee a minimum price to the producers in developing countries plus a premium for social projects such as clean water projects and building schools or health centres. If a product bears the logo then 100% of the cocoa, sugar, coffee or tea must meet the ethical requirements. The Rainforest Alliance require only 30% of their product to be independently assessed and



monitored. Rainforest Alliance also costs less for the big manufacturers as they do not have to pay for use of the logo and there is not a minimum price to pay to growers.

Fairtrade **always** means no child labour, a minimum price for farmers, good environmental standards and fair working conditions for workers. Local communities democratically decide how to spend their local premiums to improve their farming communities.

Both labels aim to offer a fairer return to producers who otherwise get a rough deal. Both aim to improve stewardship of the environment. The Fairtrade mark is harder to achieve and involves a cost to the brand.

So, as always, the choice is yours. The Tatsfield Fairtrade Group would urge you to take a step towards Fairtrade whenever possible and look for the familiar green and blue logo. It does not always mean that you pay more for the product, but if you do pay a little more then you know that you are supporting some of the poorest people who are working hard to provide us with produce we often take for granted. 

#### SILVER GILT IN BRITAIN IN BLOOM!



Because Britain in Bloom is a national competition, the venue for the annual awards ceremony can be anywhere in the UK. This year it was in Guernsey,

and so seven Tatsfield representatives travelled there for the event on 6<sup>th</sup> October – Mary Bull, Kay and Ian Longley,

The picture one has of the Channel Islands is of a warm and sunny place but it was anything but that for our visit – one of the days there was non-stop rain, with our view of Guernsey seen from under umbrellas all day. Anyway, the ceremony itself was a very impressive occasion with over 500 representatives of the 72 finalists and other guests present at the Beau Sejour hall in St Peter Port. We began at 5.30 pm and made our way back to our hotels at 11 pm.

The star guest presenting the awards was Matt Baker, who many of you will know from his TV appearances on Countryfile and other programmes. When our turn came, Tatsfield was awarded a Silver Gilt in the Large Village category, with the winning position taken by Market Bosworth (in the East Midlands) with a Gold, followed by Melrose (in Scotland) also with a Gold.

We had a 15 minutes surgery at Guernsey with our judges the next morning who said that our Silver Gilt marking (75-84%) was a high one, just short of Gold. The judges had this to say in their report:

"Tatsfield is to be congratulated on the overall community spirit which the Bloom campaign is encouraging. Several ambitious projects this year include the new allotment site and the eye-catching Olympic feature on the Bakery green. The Bloom group is to be congratulated on its fund raising efforts and for all the work that they do to enhance this lovely village."

Their report also included these detailed comments: "The green roof at the school was one of the best we had seen ..... We noted the pride of the residents at Crossways Court in creating a colourful and attractive amenity area ..... The village was exceptionally clean and tidy ..... All those connected with the new allotment site are to be congratulated."

So, standing back at the end of the year, how do we assess it? So far as the competitions are concerned, it has perhaps been our most successful year yet – in South and South East in Bloom, Best Large Village with a Gold award and the Surrey Life trophy for the highest score by any entrant of any size in the county and

in Britain in Bloom, a Silver Gilt award. It is the unanimous view that our displays celebrating the Queen's Diamond Jubilee and the London Olympics have been the best we have created. They were the result of the enormous effort by our grand team of volunteers and of the skills of village artists and craftsmen, and they have given much pleasure to villagers and visitors alike. Our aim in carrying out our programme of work each year is not just to do well in In Bloom competitions but also to have an attractive and clean village all the year round, and we hope we are achieving that.

We finished off the year with our Celebration Evening on 12<sup>th</sup> October, when about 80 people were present at the WI Hall to hear final thanks being given to the many organisations and people involved, including especially our hard-working volunteers and our generous sponsors (Whelan Farms, Park Wood Golf Club, Howard Cundey, Knights Garden Centre Woldingham, IQ Wealth Management, Surrey County Council, the Parish Council and the Horticultural Society. South and South East in Bloom awarded twelve "Certificates of Excellence" to those who have made special contributions this year. 



#### PROFILE OF PARISH COUNCILLOR MARTIN WESTERMAN by Sue White

Martin Westerman is the last of our Parish Councillors to come under my scrutiny. He joined the Parish Council in March of this year and as a building surveyor the Council are able to call upon his expertise in this area. Having grown up in Orpington, Martin hasn't travelled too far to his current home in Biggin Hill, although it is his and wife Georgina's third home in the town. The couple met in a Beckenham pub where Martin recalls bravely rescuing Georgina from two drunken Scotsmen and in 1995 they tied the knot in Bromley Registry Office. #### Correspondence:

This past month has been very quiet on the correspondence front, but at least that gives us the chance to catch up on some outstanding items.

Back in June, Belinda Ayling contacted me with a bee query (25.06.12):

'We live in Rose Cottage along Ricketts Hill and think that we might have honey bees living in the walls of our annex, which is quite old with wood panels. We were wondering if you know of anyone in the village that would be able to confirm our thoughts? We are happy for them to stay (the bees that is!) as we believe they were also there last year, but would like to confirm that they are not carpenter bees as they cause damage to the wood. We would not like them to chew through as they would then get into the house. I have looked on the internet and seen pictures, but would like confirmation for peace of mind.'

I got on to Bob David (who I knew was bound to know local bee experts!) and the necessary contacts and arrangements were made. This was the outcome (06.07.12):

() I kindly had Paul (Jackson) round on Tuesday to have a look. Unfortunately, the weather was damp and raining but from what he saw he believes them to be **Bumble-bees**, and the little ones I have seen that are black could be the babies, but unfortunately they were not active and stayed inside. Paul did advise that although he did not see the little bees, they do not share their nests so they are probably all bumbles. He had a listen through the wall from the inside where we hear them. He believes that we could have maybe one to two hundred living in the annex wall. We are happy for them to stay as they cause no harm and we need to protect the few bees we have left. Paul said that on a sunny, dry day we would see more of them flying about and if we were concerned he would come back. Unfortunately, the weather has turned for the worst and we have not seen them much, but we are happy just listening to them!'

This was amazing news, Belinda. I thought Bumble-bees were solitary nesters and yet you have hundreds! With a little research I found that bumbles do indeed live in colonies, usually up to 150 in number. You could have the largest, and perhaps the only, Bumble-bee colony in the parish. Well done you for having such a wonderful attitude towards their care and conservation. And well done Paul for identifying this local natural treasure. May the bumble's buzzing be long and thunderous!

Ten days later I received an email from Kay and Ian Longley (16.07.12):

'Whilst in the garden earlier this year we noticed a **Robin** flying in and out of our garage side door. She had decided to nest inside. Ian was concerned that when we locked up each day the Robin wouldn't be able to reach the nest, so he cut a round hole in the door (how kind is that?) and the Robin continued to fly in and out. The new Robin family survived and our garden is now

definitely their territory. Then, yesterday - surprise surprise - a new fledgling Robin was hopping around the garage floor. Is this normal – two families so quickly? Perhaps it's to do with the comfort of the accommodation, or maybe the ever topical weather!'

Well, Kay, I'm sure the accommodation is an incentive to stay, particularly when provision has been made for a private entrance (!), but in fact it's perfectly normal to have two broods one after the other, usually between April and August. The old myth of springtime-only breeding simply isn't true, which is why (as Jon reminds us in his garden notes) hedge-trimming has to be done so carefully during the summer months as well as earlier. Of course, not all fledglings survive, but one or two generally do. Let's hope that's true of yours.

These acts of kindness remind me of the workers at a south coast power station who have taken it upon themselves to become the guardians of a few non-migratory Swallows. Between them they ensure that the birds maintain access to the industrial 'barn' where they have chosen to overwinter. Mind you, with a harsh winter being forecast I feel their efforts may be in vain.

Moving on to August, we had an interesting sighting by Liz Armitage and, as it turned out, myself (27.08.12):

'Just been watching a bird walking round and round the raised paving of our fishpond, seemed to be looking for water. Alan thought it was a baby thrush (in August?) but on checking our bird book it looks most like a Pipit – is that possible? Unfortunately, camera not charged (is it ever when I need it!) so missed photo opportunity – but if it comes back I will be ready!'

Well, Liz, in posing this problem you've inadvertently helped solve mine. I was walking back towards the village from Beddlestead last Friday when I saw what at first I thought was a Skylark run across the 'path' in front of me, then disappear into the wheat stubble at the side. Later, of course, I remembered that Skylarks don't behave like that, they simply take flight. And, upon recollection, this bird was of a more slender form. In fact, I now realise it was a **Meadow Pipit.** So, was your bird the same one? I reckon you would know a young thrush if you saw one and August is actually a little late for thrushes to be breeding. So, a Meadow Pipit in your garden? It seems unlikely, but not impossible, particularly as I saw one not too far away the same day. Don't forget to mark it on your 'Bird Survey' form!

#### And finally:

We've had a couple of visiting **Jays** for the past few weeks along Greenway. There is currently an influx from Scandinavia, where there's a shortage of acorns and other seasonal foodstuffs. Those of you with **Oak** trees – what's your acorn crop like this autumn? Have you been visited by many Jays?

#### **COOKING WITH HERBS – MEAT**

Continuing our theme of flavour- enhancing kitchen herbs, we've arrived at the meat course. And naturally, everyone will say "**mint** or **rosemary** with lamb and **horseradish** with beef" and that's it. But that definitely is NOT "**it**" as there are *so* many interesting herbs to add to meat dishes, all easily grown in Tatsfield, using simple recipes that are so welcome to come home to during the darker months of the year.

Of course **mint** and rosemary are good winter herbs, but to retain mint *leaves* throughout the winter months up here you will probably need to pot a favourite variety and grow it in a frost-free environment; a windowsill, heated greenhouse or kitchen worktop is an ideal place. My favourite varieties to use with meat, potatoes or to sprinkle on to Indian or middle-Eastern cuisine are Moroccan Mint (white flowering with a bright green, attractive leaf) or Tashkent Mint (taller, red stemmed and a strongly growing perennial). Both successfully overwinter in Tatsfield but die down when left outside, with new strong growth showing early in the year. So, best pot up a few roots for the cold months, then plant these out to recover in spring and use another area of root to pot up for the next year, and so on.

**Horseradish**, that huge-leaved almost weed of a herb goes exceptionally well with beef, of course. But digressing from the meat course, try this literally eye-watering white root grated with double cream, Dijon mustard and a little sugar with freshly grilled mackerel, or spoon this mixture into smoked salmon pate with lots of lemon juice squeezed into the mix – delicious, with a gentle but unexpected "bite" that goes down well at a dinner party! Horseradish is a *must* for the keen cook to grow at the back of the herb garden, the unattractive leaves belie the amazing flavour extracted from the roots, and even a small piece of root will eventually grow into an impressive plant, so do give it a try. Beg, borrow or (perhaps not!) steal a root from a neighbour in early spring, and enjoy your own home-grown harvest in a year or so. To grow long straight roots, easier to peel and grate obviously, grow in good compost rather than stony garden soil, and dig a deep hole when planting to accommodate both new compost and the chopped up root portions. Watch out though - this plant will take a plot over if not kept in check!!

Strongly flavoured herbs, not surprisingly, are at their best when combined with strongly-flavoured meats. **Winter Savory**, a hot peppery-tasting herb, is very under-utilised at present, but was grown throughout the UK for centuries as a pot herb. Similarly **Hyssop**, a rather bitter herb but so useful in slowly cooked casseroles, is due for a revival. With electric-blue flowers throughout summer and hardy, ever-

green leaves looking something like young rosemary leaves, a sprig of hyssop can add an interesting twist to any beef, venison or lamb stew. Although venison is in the "game" and not "red meat" category, while we're on the subject of slowly- cooked casseroles using herbs such as hyssop, here is a favourite recipe of mine that can easily be adapted to suit your own tastes. To your own quantity of lightly-browned onions, red pepper slices and leeks, add cubed venison (or beef) that has been previously lightly coated in seasoned flour and browned in hot oil. Add a glass of red wine to deglaze the pan, some roughly chopped carrots and celery to taste and place in a casserole dish. Top up with



water or stock to cover the ingredients, add some lightly-crushed **juniper berries**, a **bayleaf**, sea-salt, chopped **parsley** and a handful of **hyssop**, **marjoram** or **winter savory**. Cover and cook for two hours in a medium oven or on the hob. Serve with lots of creamy mashed potato, perhaps with a little horseradish grated in for extra flavour and some freshly-chopped parsley over all.

This is the ideal time to think about **parsley** as a cooking ingredient and *not* just a garnish. This is such an under-rated herb, usually with a sprig used purely for decoration, and just as usually discarded at the end of the meal on the side of the plate! Parsley leaves **and** stalks should be *cooked* – the flavour comes out in long, slow cooking, unlike many herbs usually of Mediterranean origin that need to be added just at the point of serving to retain all their flavour. Think of parsley as an *ingredient*, not an addition, and it will reward you with so much more flavour. Also the vitamin content in a fresh sprig of parsley is far greater than in the dried form, which can also be rather tasteless if kept for too long. Look for broad-leaved parsley as well as the more popular curly-leaved variety, and when using chop all those stalks into your casseroles, stews and fish sauces as well as the leaves.

Finally, **Bay** leaves are an essential of stews, stocks and "bouquet garni" but can also provide a real touch of professionalism when threading lamb or beef **kebabs** onto skewers. Try alternating meat, tomato, onion and red pepper with whole bay leaves here and there to give a really attractive finish, but one thing to bear in mind is that bay leaves have a slightly narcotic effect, so don't eat all of them!

To complete this short series on kitchen herbs, "Cooking with Herbs at Christmas" seems a most appropriate title for December.

The King went around the streets saying hello and goodbye to the people living in tents. I felt worried about all those people and their children. Where would they live now? *Daisy-May Kittlety* 


#### Monday 10<sup>th</sup> September 1666

#### **NOVEMBER 2012**

In the east , once darkness has fallen, the winter constellations of Taurus (The Bull) and Auriga (The Charioteer) are beginning to make their presence felt. The evening rising of Taurus and its two open star clusters, the Pleiades and Hyades, is always seen as a sign that long cold nights are imminent.

The Pleiades are also known as "The Seven Sisters" because it was said that if you had good eyesight it was possible to see seven members of the group, although fourteen of them could theoretically be seen from a really dark site. They are a related cluster of stars thought to number at least 1,000 and are moving as a group through



space. The Hyades may be less well know but are easy to find because they form a "V" shape, with Aldebaren at the end of one side of the "V".

The nights this year however have a bonus for astronomers, which is the planet Jupiter that lies within the borders of Taurus, close to the Hyades, and now rises just after 6pm (18.00 hrs) at the beginning of November. Jupiter is the largest planet in the solar system and is a "gas giant" with a retinue of 67 moons at the last count. The map shows its position at 8pm (20.00 hrs) around the middle of the month, and because the planet moves very slowly against the starry background the map will be valid for some time. In any case it is easily the brightest object in that part of the sky.

If you are an early riser you may have seen the brilliant planet Venus just before sunrise. By 6.30 am in the middle of November it will be twenty degrees high in the south east. Its brilliance is due to thick clouds of sulphur dioxide in its atmosphere that are highly reflective. Venus will be with us until after Christmas and will be joined by its fainter neighbour Mercury during the first two weeks of December. After that Venus will disappear behind the Sun to emerge later on the other side (the east) when it will become an evening object.

I ran a family show for 20 years in Sussex and during that time I was always looking for ways to encourage more people to come each year and make for bigger crowds. A bigger crowd means more profit especially if you give good value for money to those customers. Advertising was the only way and I put by a budget of what magazines and newspapers to buy "space inches" that would reap the best result. In show business, there are such advertising editors who are looking for your money. You would be surprised as to how far

away that such people can "guarantee" that if you took out six column inches with them, your show would benefit by thousands more of attendees. One year, it was just two days after I had returned from my show in Sussex, when an enquirer telephoned from as far away as Leeds offering me incredible terms if I took out £500 advertising with them for the next year's show.

During that period we visited America and wearing a radio microphone I gave an illustrated talk to some 300 flying enthusiasts about the aeroplane show scene in the UK and Europe. If you ever want to get positive feedback from an audience, go there and chat to them, for the reception I received was just marvellous. I was amazed at the result when I finished my 30 minutes spot. I played the usual CD with the piece of jazz music with a bit more "oomph" than normal, put on the 20 years old soft leather shoes and tap danced amongst them all, shaking hands and bidding them goodbye. They all stood up and cheered and whooped for a long time. What an experience it was.

It was later that evening when I was having a cup of tea, one member of the audience was introduced to me as "Mister Two Percent". Apparently he was a publisher and therefore was "in touch" with many thousands of people. He went on that he could guarantee positive results if I advertised my show with him for a mere 500 dollars. He said that to get a response of extra crowds for show people such as me, he would insert "flyers" in his magazines and two percent of the readers would reply. He had made a whole lot of money doing this for people such as me and had made their fortunes as a result, he said. I shook hands and thanked him for his offer and said I would think about it but I must confess that I never took up his offer. But since then I have always thought about "flyers" and nowadays there are thousands of them about where companies are making huge sums of money by people ordering them to be printed.

#### **NOVEMBER NOTES**

#### The October 1987 Storm

In our very busy world it is easy to forget significant events that changed our lives, and our environment, for ever. Can you remember how Tatsfield looked this time 25 years ago? What happened that changed the shape of our countryside and, for some, our homes as well? On



16 October 1987 during the night we suffered the worst storm in living memory. It roared in from the Channel and swept up and through the North Downs ridge and nearby high ground. Trees that we thought would never fall down (oaks, planes, ash) were ripped from the ground in minutes. It didn't seem to matter whether they were ancient or young, huge or small, some simply fell under the sheer force of the wind but others seemed to have been screwed out of the ground as the force of the wind turned them round and round until the trunk shattered, scattering bits over some distance, leaving shards of wood standing where the trunk had once been.

Tatsfield is full of stories, and no doubt plenty of pictures, of damaged roofs, roads blocked and woodlands just a dangerous tangle of fallen timber. I would be very interested to hear your personal stories.

My personal memories are of being woken up by a strange and frightening roaring noise. I got up and went outside and was nearly injured by my neighbour's fence panel flying past just inches from my head. This was also my first year of a new business venture, a horticultural advisory business. I can remember as if it was yesterday my first job being part of a team of advisers carrying out safety surveys of London parks. I had never seen so many trees on the ground or in such dangerous condition that they had to be taken down.

Looking back now, it seems that we were in a hurry to replace them and many thousands of trees were planted over the next couple of years. It is only now with the benefit of hindsight that we realise the folly of clearing all those areas of wood, destroying all those seedlings and planting imported so-called 'native species'. If you take a walk through our Millennium Wood (the wood between Old Lane and Ricketts Hill Road) you will see naturally regenerated beech trees now some 3 metres tall already, full of vigour, and with careful management future generations of Tatsfielders will once again walk under the canopies of mighty beech trees.

Now is a good time for you to consider planting a tree to commemorate this great event, or your birthday, or the birthday of a child. Remember the golden rule - a small tree for a small garden. Make sure to read my December notes when I will provide advice on what to buy and how to plant.
