

### TATSFIELD PARISH COUNCIL

The Parish Council met on 8 July which I chaired in the absence of Kim Jennings who is taking a few weeks of well-earned rest and to whom we sent our very best wishes. (We also met briefly on 8 August.)



At the start of the meeting a resident expressed thanks

to the PC for cleaning several signposts in the village which had become extremely dirty, also the notice board at the bottom of Ship Hill.

### Planning – 8<sup>th</sup> July meeting

**TA/2024/630/NH and TA/2024/635/NH Ashkirk, Maesmaur Road.** Two long thin rear extensions to this existing single-storey property. **Objection:** Plans and elevations do not align with each other. The proposals represent poor design and are contrary to the NPPF, Tandridge Local Plan and Tatsfield Neighbourhood Plan. The PC recommended the applicant withdraws these parallel applications along with a previous additional storey application and resubmit a comprehensive set of proposals in line with national and local planning policies.

**TA/2024/558 1, Park Farm Cottages, Rag Hill Road.** Erection of two-storey rear extension and loft conversion with additional roof lights and box dormer. **Objection:** Taking into account previous planning approvals, this further extension would lead to 'disproportionate additions' to the built form of the original house and therefore contrary to TDC's Local Plan for the Green Belt. Furthermore, closeness to the neighbour's property would be contrary to the TDC Local Plan on Safeguarding Amenity.

**APP/M3645/W/24/3343472 (TA2023/775) Stables, Manor Livery, Manor Road.** This is the appeal against TDC's decision to refuse the application to demolish existing livery buildings and erect three single-storey dwellings. **Objection reaffirmed:** The PC previously objected to the proposals to demolish the livery stables and has done so again by reaffirming its views to the Planning Inspectorate. Such a proposal represents inappropriate development in the Green Belt and there are no Very Special Circumstances that support an exception. It is also contrary to the NPPF, TDC policies and Core Strategy and also the recently approved Tatsfield Neighbourhood Plan.

### Planning – 8<sup>th</sup> August meeting

**TA/2024/393** Lochiel, Ricketts Hill Road. Amended plans for the demolition of the existing dwelling and erection of a new dwelling. **Objection:** Apart from the inclusion now of a design and access statement, the original reasons for the PC's objection remain.

**TA/2024/725 Hill Cottage, Barnfield Road.** Demolition of existing 2-bedroom dwelling and erection of 4-bedroom dwelling. **Objection:** The proposed new build, although acceptable in design, is 'materially larger' than the existing (240% area increase and 216% volume increase) and therefore inappropriate development in the Green Belt. No Very Special Circumstances have been demonstrated.

**TA/2024/591 The Firs, Maesmaur Road.** Retention of works: Erection of a detached garage. **Objection:** The house has already been significantly extended and modified and, following previous applications and objections, the proposed addition demonstrably causes harm to the Green Belt and contravenes TDC policies.

### APP/M3645/D/24/3345539 TA/2024/95 1, Park Farm Cottages, Rag Hill Road.

This is the appeal against TDC's decision to refuse the application for the erection of a first-floor side extension. The PC's objections and TDC's refusal were based on the cumulative effect of a number of previous extensions and inappropriate development in the Green Belt. The PC has now referred its objections to the Planning Inspector. They are supported by TDC's case officer.

**Old Bus Shelter** A small sum of expenditure was approved to finish off work to the Old Bus Shelter. It has now been cleaned and repainted, the roof has been repaired and treated. The three games fixed to the rear wall have already attracted lots of positive attention. Thanks go to several PC colleagues for all their hard work.

**Furze Corner** Now that the PC has taken over the lease for Furze Corner, Jason Syrett has been encouraging interest from residents who might be prepared to become part of the Steering Group to take the Furze Corner project forward. By the time you read this, the first meeting of the group will have been held but more members are still required so if there are any other interested parties please be in touch with the PC or Jason direct. The objective is to develop this as a project for the local community and the key task now is to formulate a business plan for the building and running of a new pavilion. There will be a full consultation process with the community in due course.

**Little Acorns** The PC has received a kind letter of thanks from Lisa Turner, the outgoing Chair of Little Acorns. The new Chair, Katie Bath, attended our meeting and gave a brief summary about future plans which included some substantial fundraising. Little Acorns is such a valuable and much appreciated asset to the village.

### TANDRIDGE DISTRICT COUNCIL

August is a very quiet time generally for any District Council with the main emphasis on the school holidays and getting away, so it is a quiet report this month to go with it.

The period before the beginning of August had committee meetings on Community Services and the Full Council. During late July Tandridge District Council undertook a Corporate Peer Challenge (CPC) from other similar officers from the Local Government Association. The purpose of which is to test systems, seek improvements and assurances for both officers and members (that's us Councillors) to work better together. The UK government expects councils to have a CPC every five years.

It will also assist the Council in meeting part of their Best Value duty, by these Officers with their experience and knowledge of local government reflecting on the information as presented to them by the Officers and Councillors alike. The intention is that feedback is issued as critical friends but independent friends by not being assessors, consultants or inspectors. My involvement as a Group Leader along with ClIr Gray (Lib Dems) and ClIr Bloore (Conservatives) was to share with them the situation as seen from our point of view, effectively the opposition. ClIr Sayer on behalf of the administration had her own meeting with the Peers. The final report will be issued by October, so as soon as I have the link to this report I will report it here.

One decision which came from the Community Services committee was to cease the "Cesspool Emptying Service" due to ageing equipment and increasing costs. This came as a bit of a shock to its regular users in Tatsfield, without due notice or even recommendations of where else the service could be obtained from. I raised the matter with the Deputy Chief Executive and the Chairman of the Community Services committee at the full council meeting. And whilst an apology and an acceptance that "there are some lessons to be learned on how this decision should have been better communicated and implemented to current customers." this does not help. I know this does not make it any more helpful to you and I hope you have all been able to seek services elsewhere.

Voting Issues. I am following up the fact that a Tatsfield resident was unable to vote at either my own District Council or the General Election because she did not have one of the usual suspects for Acceptable Identification and did not have the technology to make the online application for one of the alternatives. I have written to our recently reelected MP to find out the Minister or the Government department that made this decisions to see if we can get other things accredited such as Surrey County Council Identification badges or even their bus pass, If anything comes of it I will let you know.

The Council is currently preparing a consultation response to the new draft NPPF. The consultation started on Tuesday  $1^{st}$  August and closes on 24th September.

To confirm, the new housing number for Tandridge District calculated under the

Government's new standard methodology is 773 dpa (compared with 634 dpa previously) and this is now a **mandatory** target.

The result reflects that the Conservative Party lost many of our voters. We must now do everything we can to rebuild that trust. It has been an unprecedented few years for the country.

In this new Parliament, I will shadow my previous role of Secretary of State for Energy Security and Net Zero. An effective opposition plays a core role in our parliamentary democracy. We will not oppose for the sake of it, but I believe that when we disagree, it is our responsibility to say so – especially when it comes to securing enough cheap energy to keep the lights on in this country.

In the King's Speech, the government announced a new Planning Bill which is widely reported to remove the right of local communities to reject housing developments when they don't think they are right for their neighbourhood. I know many of you will be worried about what this means for our area.

We absolutely need affordable homes for local families and key workers including teachers and nurses but forcing through new developments without a proper role for residents to question local infrastructure, traffic or access to green spaces or public

services is not the answer. I'm going to be meeting Tandridge District Council to discuss what these plans mean for our area, and how we can provide constructive opposition to ensure that we get the affordable homes we need, while managing infrastructure pressures and protecting our green spaces.

# Digital switchover is coming! What's coming? Digital switchover, that's what.



Across the country, Openreach and other telecoms companies are rewiring the telephone network to do away with the "copper wire",

known as Analogue, and replace it with "fibre", which is Digital. The old analogue networks have been in operation for decades and have reached the end of their serviceable life. The telecoms industry is finding it difficult to source the parts required to maintain or repair connections as suppliers are no longer manufacturing them.

New digital phone lines will allow phone companies to offer consumers and businesses clearer and better-quality phone calls, as well as new features such as anonymous caller rejection or three-way calling (for instance where you could speak to your Son in Newcastle and your Daughter in Kent all on the same phone call).

This is great news for most as it will be a more reliable connection and faster broadband. But, as with all new technology, there will be losers as well as winners. The losers are likely to be the older and more vulnerable people. As a result, UK Neighbourhood Watch is making sure the NhW co-ordinators and members across the country are aware of what is coming down the line (terrible pun, sorry).

The old analogue landline carries a low voltage power connection directly from the telephone exchange, which is sufficient to power some basic corded handsets without needing a mains electrical supply. This means that in the event of a local power cut, these corded handsets will continue to function as long as the telephone exchange still has power.

Digital landlines cannot carry a power connection, which means handsets and routers must be powered from your home power supply, and they will not function in a power cut unless you have a backup power system such as a battery or generator.

This means elderly and infirm people with care-lines may not be able contact their care provider via their special adaptor during a power cut. We would expect that your local borough/district "care-line" service would already be checking their clients, but many people use private care-line companies. The solution in most cases is a modern SIM-based "box" which uses mobile phone technology. Also be aware that your burglar alarm company may still use this old land-line technology and so that link will also fail during a power cut. We would suggest you contact your burglar alarm company to check.

If you have managed to keep up with the above it will be clear that our elderly/infirm family and neighbours are the ones likely to have issues. BT are being very good about providing solutions, but I cannot see any other telephone service provider doing anything. If you or a neighbour/family member use care-line services please contact the service provider if there is a concern. If you or they are not sure who provides it, and the current service uses the land line, trigger the alarm and see who answers!

BT are running events across Surrey in September and Neighbourhood Watch is supporting this initiative. Watch out for notifications of these events from NhW and BT.

The digital switchover is happening now and will be completed by end of 2025. Please don't blame the government – this is not their doing, for once.

- Police Link Officers for Deaf people (PLOD) if you are deaf, you can SMS text us on 07967 986130.

• Herbert Protocol – if you care for someone with dementia or Alzheimer's, the Herbert Protocol ensures we have the essential info to act fast and keep them safe, if they go missing.

### Are your details correct?

Every year, we check the details on the <u>Electoral Register</u> are correct, so everyone who is eligible to vote in elections can have their say. This is known as the <u>Annual Canvass</u>.

You will receive your form either by post or e-mail. Please check the details on your form when it arrives.

The form or e-mail will tell you what to do if you need to respond, as not all households will have to. If you need to make a change, it is quick and easy to do online or by phone. All the details you need, including the security codes, are on page one of the form.

Any 16- or 17-year-olds living in your home can be included on the form, even though they can't vote until they are 18.

From September, if we haven't heard from residents who need to provide a response, we will contact them by phone or visit them at home to get this vital information. We will not ask you for any financial information and our representatives will have identification and they won't ask to come into your home. If in doubt, please call Customer Services on 01883 722000.

## THE TATSFIELD GARDENER IN JULY AND AUGUST

Looking back over the summer months we certainly seemed to break some records, and yet we did not have any really hot weather for more than a day or two at a time. As the climate change scientists are predicting, when it was hot it was very hot and when it rained boy oh boy did it rain!! My two water butts held sufficient water for watering the greenhouse tomatoes and cucumbers plus the various pots and trays outside and, as I write, they are both still half full.

It has also been a record year for growth, for some that was great news for flower, fruit and vegetables; for others it was a case of record growth of weeds, hedges and of course a long grass cutting season! The prospects for this month are broadly the same, changeable, some short hot spells, some rain, maybe some thunderstorms too.

The summer flower displays in my baskets and big pots were very good despite sone rain and wind damage. I avoided the sudden slowdown in flowering (August and September) by giving them a liquid feed every three weeks from late July, dead heading every week and making sure the containers did not dry out.

My garden has a lot of tender perennials - plants that have done very well in pots and in the borders (planted out in June) but are not hardy, they will succumb to cold frosty weather. These include Geraniums, border and basket Begonias, Fuchsias, Dahlias, Canna (Indian Shot), my beautiful Brugmansias (Angels Trumpets). Later this month and into October I will be checking that they are correctly labelled, mainly for colour, so I can get the



planting scheme right when I plant them out again next June. I will be taking cuttings of my Geraniums and Fuchsias, putting them in a 50:50 mixture of horticultural sharp sand and vermiculite inside an unheated propagator with a clear plastic lid. After an initial watering I will only give them a daily fine spray over the foliage to help keep them cool; if there is hot weather, I will cover the lid with green mesh shading. All being well they should be rooted in about three weeks. The rooted cuttings will be carefully removed from the sand mix and potted into multipurpose compost in cell trays (24 cells to a tray), the trick now is to grow them on very slowly over the winter months making sure to keep them just moist enough but never wet. The Cannas, Dahlias, Begonias, Geraniums, Brugmansias and Fuchsias will be brought into the greenhouse, allowed to almost dry out and then kept in pots and trays – more on this next month. I have noticed around the village the number of climbing plants, particularly Roses, Vines and Wisteria that have made a very big amount of growth this year, waving in the breeze waiting to catch an unwary passer-by! These plants need to be trimmed back (summer pruning) and tied in now to make them more manageable and ensure there is a display next year. This year I am using zip ties rather than light wire or gardening twine, much stronger and easier to use – but – make sure to check this next year as the plants grow to avoid the ties strangling the new growth.

## TATSFIELD COMMUNITY COMPOST NEWS

We have had a very busy summer of processing and composting our local community green waste to make high quality Black Gold. We are still building batches of compost ready for screening for collection next year, so keep your green waste coming until we close at the end of the month.

Our Black Gold is the ideal conditioner for our clay soil; using it as a supplement when planting shrubs and trees is the natural way to ensuring the establishment of new roots; incorporating it into the top soil makes our clay more workable; putting it on the surface in a thick layer (4-6") as a mulch preserves moisture, suppresses weeds, feeds the soil and gives your borders that 'botanic garden' look.

We have plenty of Black Gold available this month, bring your bags ( $\pm$ 1.50 per large bag) or wheelbarrow ( $\pm$ 3.00 per full barrow) on Wednesday afternoons (2.00-4.00pm) or Saturday mornings (10.00-12.00).

#### **NIGEL'S NATURE NOTES**



The previous landscape presented here, back on the 1<sup>st</sup> of July, was of a field of buttercups on a beautifully warm, early summer's day. How quickly the seasons bring about change. This photograph, taken on the footpath between Goatsfield Road and Lusted Hall Lane, shows the multitude of thistle seed heads taken on what was, at the time, the hottest day of the year.

Following the summer break, we have a wonderfully varied collection of correspondence to work through. Many thanks to those of you who have found time to share your thoughts and experiences with others within our like-minded community. As always, all of your notes will be published in due course. But, right now, let's begin with 'Adventurer Jim's' double contribution, both of which express his recent concerns and successes:

(23.06.24) 'I've delayed contacting you in the vain hope of actually seeing some **Swift** activity up at the old school this year but, so far, have drawn a blank other than a solitary bird over Tatsfield Green on June 1st. I won't know until July whether we have lost the colony and hope that I've just been unlucky in timing my visits.

On more positive news I may have had some success in raising some **Brown Hairstreak** larva. I rescued some eggs from a hedge at St Mary's that was due to be cut. Only two made it through winter and survived predation. They are incredibly difficult to spot as they perfectly mimic young **Blackthorn** leaves. Conveniently, they glow under a UV torch and I can confirm that they were still chomping away on the host plant in late June.'

(14.08.24) 'Ruth has just reminded me for the third time that I have probably missed the copy date for this month but I must, belatedly, respond to your last Nature Notes just in case I'm <u>not</u> too late.

On the butterfly front the poor year for numbers continues and I still have only seen a <u>single</u> **Small Tortoiseshell** and have not managed <u>any</u> sightings of a **White-lettered Hairstreak** at Hill Park, despite many hours scanning the treetops. Oh well, here's hoping this year is just a blip, as it was in 2012, and all species will bounce back. I lost contact with the **Brown Hairstreak** larvae I was raising at home so they were either predated or safely pupated out of sight. I'm hoping for the latter but, as I write, am yet to see my first adult BH which should be on the wing any day now.

I do have some good news, though. With so few **Swift** sightings this year I was very concerned we had lost our local small colony up at the old school building. I can happily confirm that they again nested in at least two locations (the same as last year) and I saw seven or eight birds 'buzzing' overhead. They continue, however, to shun the boxes I put up a few years ago. I foolishly unblocked the holes a little too early, allowing an opportunistic [**House**] **Sparrow** to squat and raise a family, so I can't complain too much.

Finally, yes, I agree with your identification as a **Spear Thistle**. [See July's issue.] A member of a much-maligned family but a valuable plant for many insect pollinators. I say let it bloom and if you don't want it, hoik it out before it sets seed.'

Ruth was right to be concerned, Jim, but fortunately, your second email arrived just in time. I'm one of those annoying contributors who submits his notes at the last minute!

I'm sure we are all pleased to hear that the Swift colony has successfully maintained its presence up at the old school. Unfortunately, I'm not so sure that that success has been reflected down at the Pilgrims Lane, **House Martin** stronghold. I've passed the cottages regularly over the summer months and each time the numbers seem depleted, with several nests being left incomplete and abandoned. I believe **Swallows** have fared well this year. We even had a family of two adults and four young flying around the top half of Greenway, settling on the multitude of 'telegraph' wires. I have to go back to my childhood to recollect a similar event. I wonder whose outhouse they chose to nest in.

Everyone is talking about the lack of butterflies this year. You've spotted one Small Tortoiseshell, I've spotted none. Single specimens of **Red Admiral**, **Peacock**, **Comma**, and **Holly Blue** have occasionally been seen from my window. However, my own good news is that I've had daily sightings of **Meadow Brown** and **Gatekeeper**. Common butterflies, but not usually seen flitting around the back garden. Perhaps they have been attracted by the increase in wildflowers throughout the borders?


Cameron, my tree surgeon and a keen plantsman, was the first to confirm the identity of my uninvited, yet welcome, **Spear Thistle**. Nevertheless, to have a local naturalist back that up is heartening. I wonder if any family has acted upon my suggestion of a wild plant hunt during the school holidays. I somehow doubt it, but it's not too late. Meanwhile, as Jim suggests, my giant thistle is to be deposited in the compost bin. Such is life.

## THE NIGHT SKY IN TATSFIELD – SEPTEMBER 2024

The ringed planet, Saturn, is becoming more obvious in our evening skies with it reaching "opposition" on the 8<sup>th</sup>. This refers to the time that Saturn, or indeed any planet that orbits beyond the Earth, is opposite the Sun. In simple terms it means that on that date the Earth, Sun and Saturn will lie in a line with the Earth in the middle i.e. the Earth and Saturn lie on the same side of the Sun. This means that Saturn will then be at its closest to Earth and therefore it will appear at its largest and brightest making it an ideal time to observe it.

At the beginning of the month Saturn is rising close to the east as the Sun sets (around 8pm). The ringed planet will be 20° high in the southeast by 10:30pm and then almost 30° high in the SSE by midnight. At this time, the other gas giant, Jupiter, and the red planet, Mars, are just appearing over the northeastern horizon. The map shows the



position of all three of these planets mid-month at 1am.

By the last day of the month Saturn rises in daylight and culminates (lies due south) at 11:30pm which is when it will

be at maximum altitude.

If you prefer your observing to be of the early evening variety then Venus is visible now immediately after sunset but it is very low down. On the 1<sup>st</sup> it is 7° high between west and WNW, on the 30<sup>th</sup> it is the same altitude but closer to the southwest. Please take care not to look for Venus with any type of optical aid before the Sun has set, otherwise you risk permanent eye damage if sunlight accidentally enters your eye.

Astronomical phenomena sadly often occur at unsociable hours, and such is the case on 18<sup>th</sup> September when there is a partial lunar eclipse. It begins at 3:12am and concludes at 4:15am with the maximum amount of the Moon being eclipsed at 3:45am. However, be aware that only a very small part (3½%) is eclipsed so it will look as if a small chunk is missing from the Moon's northwestern edge (on a clock face around the 2 o'clock position).

It seems only yesterday that I mentioned the summer solstice but now we are already approaching another autumnal equinox. To say that day and night are approximately equal on 22<sup>nd</sup> September is true but something of an oversimplification because the equinox occurs at a specific moment in time and on this occasion, it is 1:44pm. At that moment the plane of the Earth's equator, projected out into space would cut the Sun's disk precisely in half. **Brian Mills FRAS**

# TATSFIELD 100 YEARS AGO



**How things have changed – or perhaps not:** In September 1924 Tatsfield appeared in the South Gloucestershire Gazette in a feature about the development of air travel! A flight from the

UK to Spain could then take nine hours. Tatsfield helped ensure the journey could be made safely. On the top of the Downs at Beddlestead Lane was a vital navigational aid - the '*Tatsfield Air Lighthouse*'. Who would have thought in 1924 that 100 years later so many people would be doing the trip in a third of that time!

**Call for a sewage cart:** A further glimpse of how things were then was the call at the September parish council meeting for a sewage cart. Parish-wide main drainage was years away then but even the cost of a sewage cart would have been a strain on finances. It would need a special rate which could be sanctioned only by a parish meeting.

**But some things don't seem to have changed:** Who would have thought then that other issues in the news in 1924 would still be rather familiar to Tatsfielders now. In September 1924 the state of Old Lane after recent heavy rain was a pre-occupation of the parish council. Half the road surface had apparently been washed away, despite the fact that the district council had promised six months earlier to 'properly drain Old Lane'. The council reckoned it was 'not fair to the householders who did their best to maintain the road to have all their work undone by water from the Green and the roads converging on Old Lane.'

Another recurring problem for the parish council was the pond. Water was seeping into neighbouring properties. There was a call to fill it in. A counter-argument was that if that happened more properties would be flooded in heavy rain by water from adjoining roads draining into the pond. Another view was that if it were properly cleaned out and looked after, the pond would be an ornament and not an eye-sore. The next year the district council was once more asked in vain for the pond to be filled in. The issue was raised again decade after decade but the pond survived long enough for the most recent successful refurbishment.

There are scores of items in the archives chronicling the history of our pond. They will be available at the next **History Weekend** at the Aileen McHugo Building on **November 23<sup>rd</sup> and 24<sup>th</sup>**. As I mentioned in the July magazine, the main theme of the weekend will be the **history of your house**. Extracts from the *Inland Revenue 1910 Rate Assessment Books* stored at the National Archives in Kew will be available for you to see how your property was assessed in the years before the First World War.






