





TANDRIDGE DISTRICT COUNCIL

It has remained relatively quiet as the concentration has now been on the Future Tandridge Programme and the medium term financial strategy. Both these need to take into account the fact that budget pressures continue into 2028/29 by approximately £1M per year for four years and that appropriate savings will have to be made. Councillors have agreed eleven principles for us to achieve this and one of the principles will be for the discretionary spend on third parties will need to be reviewed. Fees and charges will also have to go up, probably by 5% along with parking charges in the district. The new telephone system is in place which will try to encourage people to use the website and the my account system is now available for you to set yourself up on the TDC website so that you can run your transactions in the same way you would your other utilities.

- Updates from the Leader of the Council, amongst other things...

Please subscribe to the Tandridge District Council Newsletter and the Business newsletter and you will receive this information direct to your email and the news will be real time instead of my relating to you on a monthly basis.

I have attended the two budget workshops, a full council meeting, the Community Policing meeting along with Simon (see my separate report), and the Community Services committee, as this will be the committee that will bear the brunt of the cuts and increased charges.

I attended both an informal meeting with the Biggin Hill Airport CEO and BHACC with David Pinchin, where the airport are now talking more readily about moving the NSA further south. We now have monthly meetings in the diary to review the 'overflying and the reporting structure' as it affects Tatsfield. In mid-November I was involved with the Independent remuneration panel for councillors where I suggested that along with the annual pay increase, the starting point for the voluntary percentage of the role should be decreased from 60% to 50% thereby offering Councillors a greater compensation for fulfilling their roles within their communities. Being a District Councillor has changed a lot since I was first elected; in those days the council ran itself and funds were more

available. These days with the restriction within the budgets there has been a knock on effect of more casework being done for residents and more time in meetings and fulfilling the good governance rules that all councils have to adhere to.

Volunteers needed to support the Tandridge Access Group We support and work with the Tandridge Access Group (TAG), a local charity dedicated to making the district more accessible and inclusive. TAG, run by volunteers, works to improve access for people with disabilities and raise awareness of access challenges in the district. The group meets at the council offices in Oxted every two months and is looking for more volunteers to get involved to work on projects or help raise funds. If you are not able to attend the meetings in person, you can join online. For more information or to get involved, please visit the Tandridge Access Group website or e-mail tandridgeaccessgroup@gmail.com. One recent success for the group has been improving a popular footpath in Oxted, connecting Granville Road and Detillens Lane, which is now accessible for anyone with a mobility scooter. New gates with special RADAR key access make it easier for everyone to enjoy the Glebe open space. TAG's website has reviews of local venues, providing important accessibility information to help people with disabilities feel more confident and welcome. New reviews or updates to existing reviews can be added via the submit a review page. TAG relies on donations and some funding from the Tandridge Lottery.

Tandridge Household Support Fund, are you struggling to pay your bills? Later this year, residents with low incomes can apply for a small grant from the Tandridge Household Support Fund to help with financial pressures. This support is crucial for those finding it difficult to heat their homes or buy food. This government funding is limited, so please apply as soon as possible once the fund opens. Applications will close when all the money has been allocated. We don't yet know the date the fund will open so please follow us on Facebook and visit www.tandridge.gov.uk/supportfund for updates.

Toilets in Oxted and Warlingham are closed for refurbishment The toilets in Ellice Road Car Park, Oxted and Leas Road, Warlingham are closed for refurbishment. We apologise for any inconvenience. In Oxted - an alternative facility is available on Station Road West.

Doorstep frauds We have heard from residents that some people are knocking on doors, asking if any repairs are needed inside. Please remember, the Council will never arrange repairs this way. Repairs for council tenants are only scheduled after you report them to us. If someone unexpected comes to your door, please remember to:

- Ask for their ID.
- Call the company to verify they are a genuine caller if you are still unsure.
- Don't share any personal information.

If they seem suspicious and refuse to leave, call the police on 999 (in an emergency) or 101 if it's not urgent.

Are you eligible for Pension Credit? This winter, changes to the Winter Fuel payment could affect you or someone you know. The Winter Fuel Payment used to be for everyone over the state pension age, but now only people getting Pension Credit or certain other benefits can receive it. Pension Credit is designed to top up weekly income 24

for those on low incomes over state pension age. If you qualify, it guarantees an income of at least £218.15 weekly if you are single, or £332.95 for couples. Even if your income is higher, you might still be eligible. Getting Pension Credit can also help you qualify for other benefits, like help with health or housing costs. Even though Pension Credit has many benefits, lots of eligible people aren't claiming it. If you have a low income or think you might qualify, call 0800 99 1234 or visit the Pension Credit information web page.

Policing Your Community – Tandridge On Tuesday October 29th Parish Councillor Simon Cook and I attended this event to listen to the presentations from both Surrey Police and the Police and Crime Commissioner. The PCC Lisa Townsend, The Borough Commander Lyndsey Whatley and the DCC Nev Kemp each gave a presentation as below, and then they answered questions and comments from the attendees. I will tell you about Simon's question at the end.

- Like all other government departments they are heading for a shortfall of £17–20 million in their budget and the savings will have to be found and they hope not to affect the main services.
- They are reporting 25% more arrests and 50% more people being charged.
- Emergency response is sixteen minutes against an expectation of fifteen minutes both numbers are improving. We are the fourth safest county. When needed the 999 response is now just three seconds and the 111 response is eight minutes.
- For the time being, Caterham will continue to be a hub for the area. No guarantees could be given about whether it will stay there as it is considered not fit for purpose in the modern era.
- It is important for your own security if we could all use video door bells or a good quality CCTV system and <u>always report all crime</u> so that the Police can build up a picture of the crime and ASB happening in our area. There is a suspicious activity portal which again will help build the picture that is needed for the Police to do their job to the full.
- One neighbouring ward has installed it's own A.N.P.R. system.
- One matter close to home is that Simon pointed out that Tatsfield has no visible policing and no community involvement with the Parish Council or the village. This elicited a promise from the new sergeant that he will make a visit very shorty.

Please can I urge you to **support our local businesses** and **societies** in every way that you can. We rely on our local business so much and we need to show our support to them to ensure that they continue to operate and prosper well in to the future.

Also please remember to help Tatsfield Good causes by buying your Tandridge Together lottery tickets.

CITIZENS ADVICE EDENBRIDGE & WESTERHAM

A major change to this year's Winter Fuel Payment means that to get the allowance that's worth up to £300, you must also receive Pension Credit. If you don't currently get Pension Credit, but think you could be eligible, it's vital to check now and apply, otherwise you could miss out.

Pension Credit tops up pension incomes and can help with day to day living costs. If you are over State Pension age, you may be eligible to claim Pension Credit, even if you own your own home or have savings. People who claim Pension Credit may also be able to get:

- The Winter Fuel Payment and other help with heating costs
- Help with rent and Council Tax
- A free TV licence for those aged 75 or over
- Help with the costs of NHS services, such as NHS dental treatment, glasses and transport costs for hospital appointments.

You could be eligible for Pension Credit if your weekly income is below £218.15 or, if you have a partner who lives with you, £332.95. Qualifying income level may be higher in some circumstances, for example, if you receive a disability benefit.

Check your eligibility at gov.uk/pension-credit or by calling the Pension Service on 0800 99 1234.

DON'T DELAY !!! - to qualify for the Winter Fuel Payment this year, you must have been eligible for Pension Credit during the 'qualifying week' of 16 to 22 September. Since Pension Credit can be backdated by three months, the last date you can make a claim for Pension Credit and still get the Winter Fuel Payment is 21 December 2024.

It takes between six and eight weeks to process new Pension Credit claims, due to high volumes of applications. But as long as you apply by 21 December, and your claim is successful, you will get the Winter Fuel Payment.





We explored what happened to the sarcophagus. It has clean cuts, leading the children to believe it was purposefully chopped up so the

archaeologist could sell the parts. The different artefacts were passed round for everyone to look at.

Next, the class were invited to think about what the Ancient Egyptians would think about their precious belongings being carved up, sold and shipped off to different locations, as

well as their land being heavily developed near sacred monuments.





artefacts. We found canopic jars, a sarcophagus lid, more shabtis and amulets as well as some bone hand clappers! Ancient Egyptians enjoyed playing music in their leisure time!

Everyone had a wonderful time, deepening their understanding of this historic period, and would love to return to spend longer exploring the museum.

NORTH DOWNS SINFONIA

CONCERT ON 9TH NOVEMBER 2024

I can't think why I have never attended one of the North Downs Sinfonia's inspiring concerts before. To have such a proficient and enthusiastic orchestra on one's doorstep and not come to its concerts is almost a crime.

The evening's concert opened with Hummel's



Premiere overture in Bb Op.101. Jonathan Maynard, the NDS' Chairman and conductor of the night, indicated that possibly Hummel's lack of universal recognition was because he didn't write any symphonies, yet the overture was the perfect opener for the concert. Initially the work almost sounded modern with its repetitive dramatic chords followed by quieter quaver phrases, yet it soon burst into the secure classical sound readily recognised by music lovers. As the music unveiled, the orchestra's accomplished players, were able to meld together in gradual build ups of tension, and, led by their conductor, demonstrating nicely judged alternations of tempi and dynamics.

Perhaps the magic name Kanneh-Mason had been responsible for the quietly expectant atmosphere of the hall as people took their seats earlier. I personally think that the Kanneh-Mason family has done more to engender an interest in classical music amongst young people than anyone I can think of, yet



Jon's introduction of Mariatu wasn't to do with her star quality. It was to do with her professionalism as a musician. She had been a joy to work with during rehearsals, Jon said, a view shared by the playing members of the orchestra.

Jon introduced the work by saying the Saint-Saëns cello concerto No. 1 should be as well-known as those by Elgar and Dvořák. I had heard it before, but in this performance there was an assuredness in the cello playing I hadn't previously noted. There was composure; Mariatu simply seemed to know what the music is about. She has a mastery of her instrument which enables it to sing its solo soaring statements, to blend in when being a member of the orchestra, and to shine its own path in passages where the soloist and orchestra are equal partners. What was produced by the NDS under Jon's baton, with a 15-year old soloist, was a memorable work that was passionate, well-controlled, and well -executed. It was a joy to hear.

After the interval Jon introduced Beethoven's 7th as being "a gift to musiciansit plays itself". Well it may have played itself, but not without the very considerable expertise of the NDS and its conductor.

The performance of the whole work was awe-inspiring, the first movement displaying a good balance of sound and uniformity of playing, and a mix and match of the strings and wind, before it danced off at the Vivace, then galloping away, the addition of the brass and timpani making it joyously triumphant, though held in control by the conductor. The second movement's steady start with the strings laying the foundations, developed into anticipation accentuated by a growing crescendo enhanced by the wind, brass and timpani, before becoming more pastoral. The third movement was certainly foot tapping, and it bounced away displaying effective interplay between strings, wind and brass. The fourth movement was dynamic, and exuberant, and, as had been the case throughout the concert, all the soloists played beautifully, executing their parts with precision and clarity.

The NDS performance was inspirational, and I am sure that I was not the only one to leave Tatsfield Village Hall feeling exhilarated and uplifted.

I would also like to record my thanks to Mariatu's and Jon's parents, and indeed to all other parents, for encouraging, fostering and nurturing the talents of their children. The commitment parents give to their children, wholeheartedly supporting them in their endeavours, benefits whole communities far and wide, large and small. Thank you.

THE TATSFIELD GARDENER IN DECEMBER AND JANUARY

I was taught early in my career that to get the very best value from a garden we must provide something to delight us every month of the year – quite a challenge! We also know just how important a consistent supply of flower and fruit is for our wildlife. A garden that has lots of interest all year round is also a valuable habitat for wildlife and this is especially so during the winter months when flowers, seeds, and places to find shelter can be vital for survival.

If you are struggling to think of a suitable Christmas present for the gardener who seems to have all the tools they need, just imagine their delight when you present them with a plant in full flower! For a larger garden the beautiful winter flowering cherry (Prunus subhirtella) with its pink flowers, good autumn leaf colour and also tiny cherries (food for hungry birds). If you have a semi-shady spot to fill then try the Sweet Box (Sarcococca) with its profusion of tiny white highly scented flowers, and again plenty of black berries in the spring; and if space allows surround this lovely shrub with Christmas Rose (Helleborus) in various colours. Winter flowering plants are also available as small plants too, the winter Crocus (Crocus tomasinianus), Snowdrops, the Winter Aconite (Eranthis hyemalis) and the ever reliable Winter Heather (Erica carnea) – carpets of colour buzzing with bumbles on a sunny winters day. If you have a South or West facing fence why not cover it a Winter Jasmine (Jasminum nudiflorum) or the Silver Tassle Bush (Garrya elliptica), or Coronilla citrina all superb plants. You may not find some of these plants in your local garden centre so have a look online for those specialist nurseries just waiting for your order!

A final thought, for the perfect present for someone special who has a warm South or West facing patio with room enough for a large frostproof pot, buy them a white or red winter flowering Camellia sasanqua. This superb shiny leaved evergreen shrub with its beautiful flowers will require planting in an ericaceous planting compost.

Growing small batches of plants from seed can be a challenge when it comes to finding a container small enough with a clear cover and then provide some heat to get it started. Have a look at windowsill propagators; they come complete with a heated tray, tiny seed trays with clear lids – just plug in and wait for the seedlings to emerge! These are available in larger garden centres or have a look on the Two Wests and Elliott website (www.twowests.co.uk).

We have had an exceptional fall of leaves this autumn and there is still much to do clearing them up, or should we be so tidy? If you must clear them away, you can combine them with some grass mowings (yes, on a dry day you should continue to lightly mow the grass!) and pack them down tight into bags; please resist the temptation to burn them!! Please remember that a pile of leaves provides a much needed safe haven for wildlife both large and small so take care and look out for sleepy slowworms, dozy mice, frogs, toads and of course hedgehogs. A pile of leaves in a quiet corner, or the back of a border, is a five star hotel for wildlife.

WILDLIFF GARDENING TIPS FOR DECEMBER

Merry Christmas folks! I am really looking forward to seeing our early daffs welcoming in the New Year with a fabulous burst of colour. And, of course, the awesome display around the green that seems to bloom just a little bit later. They're a great reminder that the days will be getting longer, and that spring isn't a million miles away. I also like to grow them in case any bumbles need to pop out for a mid-winter forage (we started seeing bumbles in January last year). So I was stunned to find out that many daffodils don't produce any bee-friendly pollen because they are modern sterile hybrids bred purely for shows. That seems pretty weird and Frankensteiny! I'm told it is the flamboyant variants that are the worst, so I stick to the traditional native types such as Tenby & Lent Lily, along with Rijnveld's for that super early bloom. I am sure Jon will know a few more — I keep meaning to ask him to write a list of insect friendly winter flowering plants that do well up here.

OK, so maybe it's a bit late to be talking about choosing daffs when its already time for them to be growing but the same thing applies to many other plants you might be planning for Spring planting. Non-native plants such as japonicas, rhododendrons, even the humble Cherry Laurel, and many others can be bad news for wildlife so its always worth checking first before choosing a new plant. We visited a Victorian garden last springtime that had been planted with Rhododendron, and it was completely devoid of any other life – it was eerily silent with no birds, butterflies, bees or bugs anywhere. Or bluebells for that matter, while we're on the b's. The problem is that much of our mini wildlife evolved without these imported plants and they don't know what to do with them; many butterflies, for example, will only lay their eggs on native plants because that's what their caterpillars have evolved to eat. So it seems non-native plants can disrupt the whole food chain. Just something to bear in mind if you are doing any garden planning this winter.

Interesting fact of the month. In a BBC poll, Winston Churchill was voted the greatest Briton of all time, ahead of Charles Darwin in second place. Both men were extraordinary local heroes, and both were avid wildlife gardeners. How cool is that? We are in very good company! And their wildlife gardens are still there for us to enjoy at Chartwell and Downe, presumably without a single pollen-free daffodil in sight.

And here's a bonus interesting fact borrowed from Marie Shallcross who gave a wonderful talk to the garden club some weeks ago - apparently daffodil bulbs can last over 100 years! So maybe some of the plants on view at Chartwell & Downe were also enjoyed by those great men themselves.

And seeing as Christmas is coming, I'll sign off with a Hoe Hoe Hoe...

NIGFL'S NATURE NOTES

For some unknown reason, Jan Akhtar's computer and my own have no interest in communicating. (And, yes, we both check our 'junk' files!) Fortunately, I had a hard copy of Jan's uplifting nature notes posted through my letter box. So, after considerable delay, here they are (29.08.24):

'I have always enjoyed reading your monthly article in the Parish Mag and, probably like many people, have often thought I ought to send you some info regarding nature spotting in our garden, but never seem to get around to doing so! Anyway, having read [a recent] article, I realised that we have a few birds that I haven't seen listed. We have a very busy feeding station outside my kitchen window and have been delighted to see regular Marsh tits and, though hard to distinguish from the former, Willow tits!

We are so incredibly lucky living at Furze Corner, as we have such a selection of habitats; garden, woodland and open field. The diversity of birds is amazing! A daily selection currently is: Blue tit, Coal tit, Great tit, Long-tailed tit, Marsh and Willow tit, Nuthatch, Blackcap, Dunnock, House sparrow, Wren, Robin, Chaffinch, Song thrush, Blackbird, Goldfinch, Jay, Pied wagtail, Starling, Magpie, Crow, Jackdaw, Wood pigeon, Stock dove (we have a visiting pair at the moment), Great spotted woodpecker, the occasional Bullfinch, Pheasant, many birds of prey (mainly Kites and Buzzards flying over) and, of course, Emus!

Birds give me so much pleasure and one of the best things that we added to our garden, a few years ago, was a bird bath, kindly given to me as my leaving gift from Tatsfield School. I can waste hours watching the birds bathe and sometimes there is literally a queue waiting for their dip!

One of the most endearing sights that I once witnessed was of two Woodpigeons taking a bath together and one was cleaning the other. They must have been in there for almost ten minutes and they even lifted up their wings to clean underneath! They are such funny birds and not everyone's favourite, but I love them.

Anyway, I'm now rabbiting on, but I will end with a well-known phrase that I remind myself of when I am lost in nature-gazing and reprimand myself for 'wasting' time:

'What is life but full of care, if there's no time to stop and stare."

Thank you for sharing your thoughts and observations with us, Jan. As you say, the varied habitats around your home certainly give you privileged status. I'm just wondering what any 'out of village' readers will make of your Emu observation: 'Quick, grab your camera, get in the car – Emu's have invaded Tatsfield!' Good business for our tea rooms.

Next, I hope our readers will be able to help answer an enquiry from our friend, Howard (Aylett). It appears that he's going (gone) a bit batty in his old age! (09.10.24):

'Just a point of interest which you may have some insight on. For many years we would of an evening enjoy the company of **bats** flying around in our garden. In fact there was one occasion where one found its way, uninvited, into the house which created an

almighty domestic bedlam - cats going berserk, dogs barking and us adults running around waving our arms about. Happily the intruder found its own way out and life for us returned to normal. However, we just haven't seen a bat since, which has posed a few questions: Has their habitat been disturbed and therefore they are no longer around? Is their food source, once found in our garden, no longer available? Or, most likely, have we upset the uninvited visitor who has told his mates to stay clear of 'Greensleeves' at all costs!? Any ideas?'

There may well be good reasons to steer clear of 'Greensleeves', Howard, but I doubt whether your family panic would have been enough to frighten the bats off. In fact, I would have thought the black cats, the collection of frogs, the boiling cauldron of lizard's tongues and the besom broomstick would have attracted <u>more</u> bats rather than scared any residents away! My personal preference to explain the loss would be habitat disturbance or destruction. Have you, or a neighbour, had any roof repairs or major tree felling carried out since the event? The Bat Conservation Trust, looking from a broader viewpoint, suggests other factors may be in play:

'Several news outlets have published articles reporting that there has been an increase in the reports of malnourished bats, particularly pups [immature bats] this year and have linked this to wetter than average weather and a decline in insects. It's important to remember that there are always natural fluctuations in wildlife populations, including bats, which may happen at different scales. This year's unusual spring and summer weather can only be speculatively linked to any fluctuations.'

So, I'm sorry Howard - habitat loss, weather variation or insect decline - take your pick, your guess is as good as mine.

The correspondence then continues (15.10.24):

'Many thanks for your reply, and I suppose it confirms my beliefs, particularly since chanting 'double, double, toil and trouble' failed to come up with an alternative answer, or the return of any bats. That, of course, could have been the cauldron not being up to temperature, what with energy costs these days. Anyway, Nigel, I just wondered whether any similar observations had landed on your desk.'

Well, I for one have had a few close, evening encounters with a couple of local bats that were seen flitting around just two or three yards distance from my patio doors during the summer months. Let's hope others will have experienced something similar. If so, please write in. Thanks for the enquiry, Howard. As always, it's good to hear from you.

And finally, will 2025 be the year of the Hoopoe? Highly unlikely, but I'm both an optimist and a dreamer. With this in mind, I wish all of our Nature Notes contributors and readers a <u>Very Merry Christmas</u> and a <u>Joyous New Year!</u> (And may all your dreams come true.)




TATSFIELD ART GROUP

TATSFIELD 100 YEARS AGO



As 1924 came to an end, traditional activities were in full swing, but there was active discussion about the future of Tatsfield and its surroundings. The Westerham Herald, for instance, brought

the village up to date on a project which would have transformed Tatsfield. It reported that officials were 'busy taking measurements of the land for a proposed electric railway connecting Orpington with Croydon via Downe, Cudham and Tatsfield'. The proposal was thought to be viable for a few more years, but there was not enough financial backing and the scheme lapsed at the beginning of the 1930s.

TATSFIELD CHILDREN ENTERTAINED.

A JOYOUS TIME,

The Parish Hall echoed with the merry laughter of nearly two hundred village children, who were entertained by the parish on Saturday afternoon, under the auspices of the Red Triangle, Mr. W. F. Pierotti and Mr. W. E. Head acting as joint secretaries. Amongst those present were the Rector, the Rev B G. Popham, Mrs. Popham and Miss Popham.

A wealth of decorations was displayed composed of evergreens, flowers, bunting, flags interweaved with clusters of coloured balloons. The central attraction was a great Christmas Tree laden with presents.

Tea was set out on tables adorned with flowers, and the children were waited upon by an army of ladies and gentlemen. At the conclusion they were given a real treat with a At the height of the Christmas season the local predecessor of the YMCA provided nearly 200 children in the Village Hall with entertainment which included a Punch and Judy Show.

It concluded with a rendering of the 'Star of Bethlehem' by Mrs O'Reilly of Kemsley Road, followed by her eight children performing a 'dainty song and dance in Dutch costume'.

Another new idea in 1924 was that of setting up a Women's Institute in the village. The first had been established in Britain in 1915, and one had already been

set up in Westerham. A meeting in Potter's Tea Room (later to become the Bakery) to discuss forming a branch was addressed by the leader of Westerham WI, Mrs Granville Streetfeild. She spoke of the aftermath of the First World War and initial financial help from the government for women setting up the WI. She was then quoted as saying that women had now 'discovered a way with their Institute movement, of helping themselves in the rural districts, and of making life richer and wider by helping their men folk. If they made women satisfied in the country they would go a long way towards making the men satisfied.' By the time of Tatsfield WI's first meeting in the following spring there were between 40 and 50 members.

THE NIGHT SKY IN TATSFIFLD – DECEMBER 2024

In astronomy, as in life sometimes, it's all or nothing. During December the bright planets are dominating the evening sky after what seems an inordinately long wait.

Early in the month, when the Sun is 6° below the horizon at around 4:30pm, the brilliant Venus can be seen a little over 12° above the SSW horizon. As the sky darkens Venus sets in the south west, but soon after it does so, by way of compensation, Mars rises in the ENE. The result is that by 9:30pm Mars, Jupiter and Saturn are all on view and reasonably well positioned.

Towards the end of the month, look at 7:30pm to see them in similar locations with the bonus that Venus has moved to join the group and is low down in the WSW. Its position will continue to improve for the rest of 2024 and into 2025.

You can use the map printed in the November issue to locate the planets which will be accurate at 8pm in the middle of December apart from the position of the Moon.

Although Venus is by far the most brilliant object in the early evening sky, and still brightening, once it has set Jupiter, although not quite as striking, is very obvious towards the east. On the 3rd of this month, it reaches "opposition" which is when it is closest to Earth and therefore at its largest and brightest.

If you get the chance to look at it through a telescope you will see the bands of cloud that envelope the gas giant, and if you're lucky the Great Red Spot may be visible. This is an anti-cyclonic storm in Jupiter's atmosphere where winds can blow at up to 400mph. It has been present since at least 1830 and may possibly date back to as early as 1665. You may also note when viewing that Jupiter is not actually round, rather it is "oblate" which means it is flattened at the poles. This is caused by centrifugal force due to the massive body rotating in just ten hours. If you have binoculars, you will be able to watch the daily dance of the four Galilean moons as they orbit the planet, although you are unlikely to see them if your binoculars are hand-held. They really need to be tripod mounted or, at the very least, rested against a fence post or wall.

The winter solstice in the northern hemisphere occurs on 21^{st} December at 9:21am. This is when the Sun is as far south in the sky as it can get, meaning that we only have 7 hours 52 minutes and 5 seconds of daylight that day. This contrasts with the summer solstice on 20^{th} June when we had 16 hours 35 minutes and 43 seconds of daylight.

2025 should be an interesting year astronomically speaking with strong meteor showers in January and December that will be unaffected by moonlight. Also, we have a partial eclipse of the Moon and a partial eclipse of the Sun, both of which are in March as well as a total eclipse of the Moon in September. So, plenty to look forward to.

Don't forget that on the night of $3^{rd}/4^{th}$ January the Quadrantid meteor shower will reach its peak. The point that the meteors appear to radiate from is close to the end of the handle of the "Plough" so watching an area generally in the north should provide a few shooting stars if the weather cooperates.

Henry VII's State Bed by Jonathan Foyle.

In 2010, the elaborately carved, incomplete oak bed frame was removed from the honeymoon suite of a hotel in Chester, to be auctioned as a Victorian relic. The speaker has spent six years studying and attributing it, now featured in press around the world. Featuring five

royal arms, six single roses, and deeply esoteric symbols of fertility, it turns out to be covered in medieval paintwork, and its proportions respect the mural of the lost Painted Chamber of royal Westminster Palace abandoned in 1512. Scientific analyses, documentation and art history agree to demonstrate it is an astonishing national treasure: the marriage bed of Henry VII and Elizabeth of York, made by 18th January 1486.



The History of Art in Wallpaper by Jo Banham.

Wallpaper is often regarded as the Cinderella of the Decorative Arts – the most ephemeral and least precious of the decorations produced for the home. Yet, the history of wallpaper is a long and fascinating subject that dates back to the 16th century and

encompasses a huge range of beautiful patterns created both by anonymous hands and by some of the best-known designers of the 19th and 20th centuries. This lecture explores the history and development of this product from earliest times up to the present day. It includes a discussion of the changing ways in which wallpaper was made and a survey of designs from the first black and white patterns, the creation of elegant flock hangings, the fashion for Chinese hand-painted papers, the introduction of machine-printing, the designs of Morris and the Arts and Crafts Movement, and the taste for Modernist and Contemporary designs in the 20th century. It also includes a discussion of the ways that wallpapers were used within grand and more ordinary homes and hopes to justify the claim that they were indeed a truly Decorative Art.
